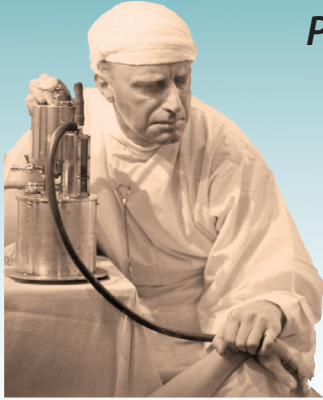

LOCATION

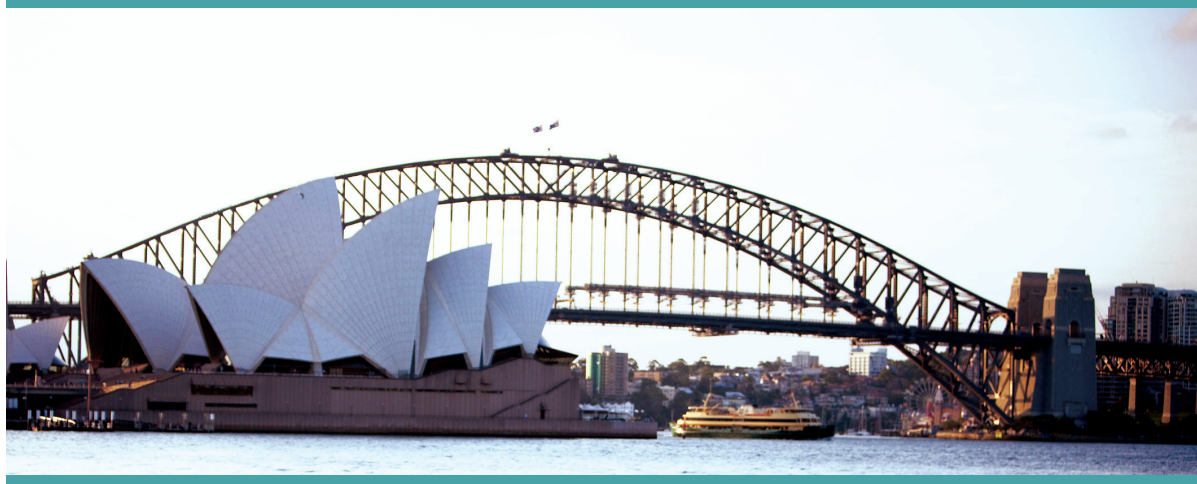
